# **Gavin's Story**

Gavin Flynn, one of our newer volunteers, relates his first impressions of and early experiences with The Mardler

When I first started volunteering at The Mardler earlier this year, I was impressed by how well organised it was. Chris, the Chairman and his wife Lorna, who's in charge of Copy and Dispatch, were very nice and welcoming. The process in the Copy and Dispatch Department was neatly explained, and once I was shown how the clearing and copying stations worked, I was set to task.

A team of us formed a conveyor belt, each playing our part. The USB sticks, which had been returned by our listeners, needed to be cleared ready for the recording of the new week's edition. Each stick had to be checked, just to make sure that the recording had been added correctly. We all made sure the address labels were showing our listener's details and the little information-packed USB sticks were popped into the plastic envelopes, sealed and put in the post bag.

One hundred and eight sticks later, it was all completed within an hour. I was amazed at how the time had flown and I had really enjoyed myself.

Afterwards Chris offered to show me around the recording studio. I imagined it was going to be a large room, stacked full of speakers at one end, with stand-alone microphones the other side and a separate editors and producers' room where the magic happens on the mixing decks, with a myriad of sliders, buttons, lights and other wonderful gadgetry.

That's what I had in my head. The room was laid out so four people could sit at two desks opposite each other, with the correctly positioned chairs and easels with microphones. The other two adjoining desks at the end would be attended by the editor and the sound engineer. And yes, there was a small mixing desk with slider controls. And a few other gadgets.

My story really starts a couple of months earlier, when I saw the advert for a volunteer Copy and Dispatch person at the Mardler. I was (and still am) unemployed and have been for some time. I

searched on the internet for more information, wading past the websites for the Norfolk Mardler Cheeses and came to the Mardler website. Realising that their listeners come first and foremost, I applied for the post straight-away.

My background is in customer service spanning the past thirty-three years. I thoroughly enjoyed customer interactions, either face to face, over the phone or email, so with an opportunity to help others, I applied. To be honest, I was feeling quite despondent after going to a series of interviews, only to be told that the golden ticket had gone to someone with more experience.

What the Mardler has done is given me a sense of belonging and with the office environment to concentrate on, it has given me my work ethic back. I have now worked at all four stations of the Copy and Dispatch process – Clearing, Copying, Checking and Packing.

Last week there was a "whoops!" moment when I was listening and checking what I had cleared and copied a few minutes earlier, only to find that an edition from **two** weeks back was still on the stick. Needless to say the offending article was put to one side. (The stick – not me).

Here at The Mardler Talking Newspaper we're quietly getting on with it and supplying our listeners with their much-needed weekly audible news bulletins. I can't imagine what it would be like to lose my sight. But I do know that I would love it if I could listen to the news and local stories from around North Norfolk every week.

I for one, am proud to be part of this charity and offer my thanks for giving me a sense of purpose.
